ESSAY QUESTIONS (75pts each): Choose two of the following essays for the exam.

1. Had you been living in the United States between 1824-1854 and had been eligible to vote, which national political leaders would you have supported? Why? Would you have been a Democrat or Whig? Be sure to cite specific philosophies, issues, and policies that would have influenced your decision and be sure to cover the entire period.
2. Explain how the destruction of the Second Party System and the emergence of a new, anti-slavery Republican party led to secession and war. Make explicit references to at least two significant events in each of the following time periods: a) 1819-1840; b) 1840-1853 c) 1854-1861.
3. The executive and legislative branches of the Federal Government had differing philosophies for accomplishing Reconstruction. Discuss these philosophical differences and describe how these philosophies and the policies they spawned shaped the course of Reconstruction between 1863-1877.
