- Abernathy, Thomas P., *From Frontier to Plantation in Tennessee: A Study of Frontier Democracy* Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 1932. A now dated treatment of westward expansion in the tradition of Turner.
- Arnold, *Flowering of the Cumberland* New York: Macmillan, 1963. A fiction writer's highly readable treatment of Nashville's formative years.
- Arnold, Harriet Simpson, *Seedtime on the Cumberland* New York: Macmillan, 1960.
- Aron, Stephen. *How The West Was Lost: The Transformation of Kentucky from Daniel Boone to Henry Clay*. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins University Press, 1996. This book represents the new western history which looks at Indian and European "collisions" and "contests" for the land in less nationalistic and self-congratulatory terms than earlier historians.
- Baldwin, Joseph G. *The Flush Times of Alabama And Mississippi: A Series of Sketches*. 1853. A humorous and insightful eye witness account of the great western land bubble that burst in 1837.
- Bergeron, Paul H., Stephen V. Ash, and Jeanette Keith, *Tennesseans and Their History* Knoxville: University of Tennessee Press, 1999. A modern interpretation of the state's history.
- Cronon, William, George Miles, and Jay Gitlin, eds., *Under an Open Sky: Rethinking America's Western Past*. New York: Norton, 1992. Essays on the new western history.
- Doyle, Don H., *Faulkner's County: The Historical Roots of Yoknapatawpha*. Chapel Hill: North Carolina, 2001. A study of one Mississippi county, its Chickasaw antecedents and the expansion of the cotton frontier.
- Dupre, Daniel S., *Transforming the cotton frontier [electronic resource] : Madison County, Alabama, 1800-1840* Baton Rouge : Louisiana State University Press, 1997. A case study of politics and society on the cotton frontier.
- Durham, Walter T., *Before Tennessee: The Southwest Territory, 1790-1796*. Piney Flats, Tenn.: Rocky Mount Historical Association, 1990. Government and politics before state formation.
- Ehle, John, *Trail of Tears: The Rise and Fall of the Cherokee Nation*. New York: Doubleday/Anchor, 1988.
- Faragher, John Mack, *Daniel Boone: The Life and Legend of an American Pioneer*. New York: Henry Holt, 1992. Now the standard treatment of this important frontier figure.
- Finger, John R. *Tennessee Frontiers: Three Regions in Transition*. Bloomington: Indiana, 2001. Includes a thorough bibliographical essay.
- Foreman, Grant, *Indian Removal: The Emigration of the Five Civilized Tribes of Indians*. Norman: University of Oklahoma Press, 1932. An old but still useful account of the removal.
- Galloway, Patricia, ed., *La Salle and His Legacy: Frenchmen and Indians in the Lower Mississippi Valley*. Jackson: University of Mississippi Press, 1982. Deals mainly with early French-Indian relations.
- Gibson, Arrell M., *The Chickasaws*. Norman: University of Oklahoma Press, 1971. Still the best single account of this less well known nation.
- Goodstein, Anita Shafer, *Nashville, 1780-1860: From Frontier to City*. Gainesville: University Press of Florida, 1989. The best book on antebellum Nashville.
- Limerick, Patricia Nelson, Clyde A. Milner II, and Charles E. Rankin, eds., *Trails: Toward a New Meaning for Western History*. Lawrence: University of Kansas Press, 1991. Essays on the new western history.

- Limerick, Patricia Nelson, *The Legacy of Conquest: The Unbroken Past of the American West*. New York: Norton, 1987. The best synthesis of the new western history, mostly dealing with the trans-Mississippi West.
- McLoughlin, *Cherokee Renaissance in the New Republic*. Princeton: Princeton University Press, 1986. McLoughlin deals largely with the effort to Christianize the Indians.
- McLoughlin, William G. *Cherokees and Missionaries, 1789–1839*. New Haven: Yale University Press, 1984.
- Mitchell, Robert D., ed., *Appalachian Frontiers: Settlement, Society and Development in the Preindustrial Era*. Lexington: University of Kentucky Press, 1991. Essays on the first West.
- Perdue, Theda and Michael D. Green, eds., *The Cherokee Removal: A Brief History with Documents*. Boston: Bedford Books, 1995. Modern essays on the Cherokee nation.
- Perdue, Theda, *Slavery and the Evolution of Cherokee Society, 1540–1866*. Knoxville: University of Tennessee Press, 1979. A leading historian of southern Indians treats African slavery among the Cherokees.
- Prucha, Francis Paul, *American Indian Policy in the Formative Years: The Indian Trade and Intercourse Acts, 1790–1834*. Cambridge, Mass.: Harvard University Press, 1962. Prucha is the leading authority on US government policy.

- Reeves, Carolyn Keller, ed., *The Choctaw before Removal*. Jackson: University Press of Mississippi, 1985. Essays on the Choctaws of southern Mississippi.
- Remini, Robert V., *Andrew Jackson and the Course of American Empire, 1767– 1821*. New York: Harper & Row, 1977. Remini is the leading biographer of and apologist for Andrew Jackson who more than any other person determined the fate of the Indians.
- Rogin, Michael Paul. *Fathers and Children: Andrew Jackson and the Subjugation of the American Indian*. New York : Knopf, 1975. A critical interpretation of Jackson's campaign to eradicate, subjugate, and remove the Indians.
- Satz, Ronald N. *Tennessee's Indian Peoples: From White Contact to Removal, 1540–1850*. Knoxville: University of Tennessee Press, 1979.
- Turner, Frederick Jackson. *Rereading Frederick Jackson Turner: The Significance of the Frontier in American History, and Other Essays*, with commentary by John Mack Faragher. New York: H. Holt, 1994. Turner's 1893 address on America's frontier heritage with comment by a modern new western historian.
- Usner, Daniel H., *American Indians in the Lower Mississippi Valley: Social and Economic Histories*. Lincoln: University of Nebraska Press, 1998. Essays by the leading authority on Indians in the lower Mississippi Valley.
- Wallace, Anthony F. C., *The Long, Bitter Trail: Andrew Jackson and the Indians*. New York: Hill and Wang, 1993. An excellent brief interpretation of the debate over removal versus reform of the southern Indians by a leading historian and anthropologist.
- White, Richard, *Roots of Dependency: Subsistence, Environment, and Social Change among the Choctaws, Pawnees, and Navajos*. Lincoln: University of Nebraska Press, 1983. Examines the impact of European encroachment on the Indian economies and how trade led to dependency.
